Boulger Cup: Old Reigations 47 – 14 Guys Hospital RFC

For the first game of what could promise to be challenging but exciting season for GHRFC, Guys traveled to Reigate for the annual Boulger Cup in memory of James Boulger, former player of both participating clubs. For many, the memory of James is still close at heart and with poignancy in the air, it was that Guy’s 159th season got under way.
